THE FRENCH KITCHEN STITCH-A-LONG

- Part 6 Crème Brulee

Robyn Allen-Waters' sixth block shows the essential ingredients in the renowned French dessert: cream, eggs and sugar.

In the June issue of *Homespun* (Vol 14 No 6), we presented the first block, *Tarte Tatin*, and the materials list to complete the whole quilt. You can order a copy on 1300 303 414 or a digital copy

through www.zinio.com or iTunes. The final assembly instructions accompany the last block.

At the beginning of December, we upload the final block of the wallhanging, *Poire Pochee* (poached pears) as well as the assembly instructions.

a recipe-journal cover or apron, or take them out of the kitchen on a bag.

Crème Brulee uses Cosmo Stranded Embroidery Cotton in 143, 164, 166, 309, 312, 702, 732, 773, 2186 and 2631 and the stitches are backstitch, satin stitch and straight stitch. Two strands of thread are used throughout unless otherwise stated.

Download the *Crème Brulee* stitchery design and print it out at 100%.

Check your printer settings: – page scaling should be set to 'None'. Measure to check it has printed at the correct size – it should be 7 x 10in.

- From the quilter's muslin or plain cotton fabric, cut:
- One rectangle, 13 x 16in. Blocks are cut oversize and trimmed before the quilt is assembled.
- From the lightweight fusible batting or interfacing, cut:
- One rectangle, 13 x 16in.
- Centre the fabric over the design and trace it lightly with a sharp pencil or water-erasable fabric-marking pen.
- Fuse the rectangle of lightweight fusible batting or interfacing to the wrong side and put it in an embroidery hoop if desired. Embroider the design

through both layers, referring to the stitchery guide above.

Don't forget to log onto our website, homespun.net.au, at the beginning of December to download the remaining stitchery for The French Kitchen as well as the final assembly instructions.
