THE FRENCH KITCHEN STITCH-A-LONG — Part 7 Poire Pochée

Robyn Allen-Waters' seventh and final block depicts juicy pears ready for poaching with some walnuts for a contrast in texture.


Embroidery


The Poire Pochée design uses Cosmo Stranded Embroidery Cotton in 143, 166, 309, 312, 386, 672, 674, 702, 732, 773, 2186 and the stitches used are backstitch, satin stitch and straight stitch. Two strands of thread are used throughout unless otherwise stated.

Download the *Poire Pochée* (poached pears) stitchery design and print it out at 100% - no page scaling. Measure to check it has printed at the correct size – it should be 7 x 10in.

- From the quilter's muslin or plain cotton fabric, cut:
- One rectangle, 13 x 16in. Blocks are cut oversize and trimmed before the quilt is assembled.
- From the lightweight fusible batting or interfacing, cut:
- One rectangle, 13 x 16in.
- Centre the design under the 10 x 13in rectangle of quilter's muslin or plain cotton fabric and trace it with a sharp pencil or water-erasable fabric-marking pen.

Fuse the rectangle of lightweight fusible batting or interfacing to the wrong side and put it in an embroidery hoop if desired. Embroider the design, referring to the stitchery guide above.





Assembly instructions

Preparation

It is a good idea to wash the stitcheries to remove any dirty marks and skin oils. Swish them through lukewarm, soapy water, rinse them thoroughly in cold water and roll them in a clean towel. When they are almost dry, place them right side up with a clean cloth over the top and press them lightly with a warm iron to avoid flattening the stitches.

Cutting

Trim all the stitcheries to $7\frac{1}{2}$ x $10\frac{1}{2}$ in. Before you do this, align the three centre stitcheries so that the horizontal lines of the French provincial kitchen table are continuous. When the quilt is assembled, you should see a complete room setting across the middle with vignettes above and below it.

- From the turquoise print fabric, cut:

 Eight strips, 1 in across the fabric width and crosscut eight strips, 1 x 7½in; eight strips, 1 x 11½in; six strips, 1 x 10½in; and six strips, 1 x 8½in (block frames)
- One strip, 2½ in and crosscut 14 squares, 2½ in (squares).
- From the small floral print fabric, cut:

 Five strips, 1½ in across the fabric width and crosscut four strips, 1½ x 8½ in; four strips, 1½ x 26½ in; and two strips, 1½ x 11½ in (sashing)
- Five strips, 2½ in across the fabric width and crosscut two strips, 2½ x 35½ in; two strips, 2½ x 30½ in (Border 1); 10 squares, 2½ in (squares).
- From the large floral print fabric, cut:
- Two strips, 4 x 39½in
- Two strips, 4½ x 37½in (Border 2)
- One strip, 2½in across the fabric width and crosscut 10 squares, 2½in (squares).
- From the cream fabric, cut:
 Five strips, 2in across the width of the fabric (binding).

Framing the blocks

For the four horizontal stitcheries, sew 1½ x 7½ in turquoise strips to

each side and press the seams outwards. Then sew $1\frac{1}{2}$ x $11\frac{1}{2}$ in strips to the top and bottom and press the seams outwards.

13 For the three vertical stitcheries, sew $1 \times 10\%$ in turquoise strips to each side and $1 \times 8\%$ in strips to the top and bottom edges, pressing as before.

Squares

Referring to the quilt photograph, arrange two sets of four squares in rows, starting and ending with a turquoise fabric square. Sew them together and press the seams. They should measure 2½ x 8½in.

Lay out two rows of 13 squares each, beginning and ending with a turquoise square and following the same colour sequence right across. They should measure 2½ x 26½ in when joined.

Assembling the quilt centre

Referring to the quilt photograph, arrange the framed stitcheries, rows of squares and sashing strips in horizontal rows. Sew $1\frac{1}{2}$ x $8\frac{1}{2}$ in small floral strips either side of a four-square row, then join Blocks 1 and 2 to either side of this unit.

17Sew $1\frac{1}{2}$ x $11\frac{1}{2}$ in small floral strips between Blocks 3, 4 and 5 to make the complete kitchen scene, pressing the seams towards the sashing. Then sew $1\frac{1}{2}$ x $26\frac{1}{2}$ in small floral strips either side of the 13-square rows and press the seams towards the small floral strips.

Join the five rows in the correct order to make the centre panel. Then sew 2½ x 35½ in small floral strips to either side and sew 2½ x 30½ in small floral strips to the top and bottom to complete Border 1.

 $\begin{tabular}{ll} \begin{tabular}{ll} Sew the 4 x 39\% in large floral strips to either side of the quilt and press the seams outwards. Sew the 4½ x 37½ in strips to the top and bottom to complete the quilt top. \\ \end{tabular}$

Finishing

Smooth the backing fabric on the floor, right side down, and secure it with masking tape. Lay the batting on

top, ensuring it is smooth. After pressing the quilt top, lay it on top of the batting, right side up, and baste the three layers together with thread or safety pins.

21 Quilt as desired. Robyn machine quilted in the ditch between Borders 1 and 2. She sewed ceramic buttons to the turquoise print squares and tied bows in the corners of all the stitchery panels through all layers. She used Cosmo 837 for blocks 1, 2 6 and 7 and 143 for blocks 3, 4 and 5.

22 Trim the excess batting and backing fabric level with the raw edge of the second border.

Cut the ends of the 2in binding strips at a 45-degree angle. Join the strips end to end to make one length and press the seams open. Fold the strip in half, wrong sides together and long edges matching, and press. With raw edges together, stitch the binding strip to the edge of the quilt with a ¼in seam, mitring the corners as you go. Join the ends neatly, referring to the binding diagrams in a copy of *Homespun* for details if necessary.

Turn the binding over and stitch it by hand to the back of the quilt. Label and date your quilt.
