
Double (woven) chevron stitch LEFT-HANDED




Work a foundation row of chevron stitch first (see the lacksquare separate tutorial for this). Then change to a coordinating or contrasting thread to begin the second row, right to left.



Form the small stitch at the opposite side of the line directly below (or above) the first small stitch. Then pass the needle under, not through, the first slanting stitch.




 $3\,\mathrm{Sew}$ the next small stitch between the short stitches of the foundation row. You are sewing two interwoven rows of chevron stitch in one line.



Then go down over the foundation row for the second 4 slanting stitch and make another small stitch between the next two of the foundation row.



Continue alternating the slanting stitches under and 5 Continue alternating the stanting statement and over the foundation slanting stitches in turn to complete this highly decorative border stitch.



The reverse side shows the pairs of small stitches in the two colours. You could also work chevron or double chevron stitch over braid or ribbon for another look.



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
